CALL OF THE WILD

An Arabian island has become a breeding ground for rare animals with visitors very welcome as long as they remember that 'animals come first', writes **SUE WALLACE.**

It is a magnificent sight watching Arabian oryx climb the hills and feed on the grasslands of Sir Bani Yas Island off the coast of Abu Dhabi.

These striking animals, once on the brink of extinction, are now thriving on the island, which is home to the world's largest herd thanks to the foresight of the late ruler Sheikh Zayed Bin Sultan Al Nahyan, the founding father of the United Arab Emirates.

Since 1971 this island has been transformed from a rugged salt dome to a wonderful breeding reserve for some of the rarest Arabian species as well as some introduced animals and thousands of birds — more than 170 species have been sighted.

There are 23 species of wildlife on the island including several cheetahs, striped hyenas, elands and barbary sheep and large numbers of dolphins, dugongs, sea turtles and exotic fish are found in the blue-green waters surrounding the island.

Most surprising of all are the 40 giraffes that seem quite at home on this island and, as the mist clears on our early morning game drive, these lofty animals head over to our vehicle to check us out and seem just as inquisitive as we are.

Nature guides take these game drives either early morning or late afternoon and have a wonderful knowledge of the delicate environment.

Under royal patronage and supervision, more than 2.5 million trees were planted as part of the Greening of the Desert program and each tree is watered by an enormous system.

Many animal species introduced to the island have thrived and are being reintroduced to the wild and sent to other areas involved in the animal breeding programs.

Sir Bani Yas Island is located 8km off the coast of Jabel Dhanna, a 250km drive from the city of Abu Dhabi. You can only get to the island, named after the Bani Yas tribe, the first tribe to populate Abu Dhabi, by boat or plane. It is the first in the Desert Islands group to develop nature-based tourism combined with animal welfare.

Today there are 1500 staff working to preserve and develop this nature sanctuary and there's a great emphasis on maintaining strict principles of ecological, social and economic sustainability.

As you drive around the 87sq km area of the island there's one rule — animals come first, and you often see some wandering across the road.

The game drives are just one of the many activities offered at the five-star Desert Islands Resort and Spa managed by boutique luxury Thai operator Anantara.

It is the island's first resort located adjacent to a lagoon on the northwest side of the island.

A stunning small resort with 64 rooms, it has six private lodges, free form infinity-edge swimming pool, top restaurants, a spa and health club.


It is the type of place that is hard to leave, a place where you can be as busy as you want or just chill out by the pool.

The opulent hotel decor reflects the Arabian mystique that Abu Dhabi is so well-known for.

For the energetic you can head out on one of the bike routes winding through the mangroves or dry wadis and experienced riders can opt for the steeper and hilly off-road routes.

There's an archery range and training and equipment for beginners is available with expert guidance.

The waters surrounding the island are a paradise for snorkellers with offshore reefs and a newly formed lagoon. Depending on the weather, there



are several snorkelling sites available providing a glimpse of abundant and colourful sealife.

If you are lucky you may spot dolphins, dugongs and turtles in the bay areas. Kayaking with a guide takes you through the mangroves and there's plenty of time for a quick dip.

You may also see resident flamingos, seagulls, cormorants, wild fowl, pintails, shovelers, black-winged stilts, teals, crab plovers, avocets and grey herons.

Guided walks over the rugged landscape visit different parts of the island, some have an emphasis on wildlife, others on birdlife or the environmental, historical and archeological highlights of the area.

Rooms are spacious with great views of the sea or gardens and all modern amenities.

Just a short walk from the hotel is the Saffa Spa

offering a wide variety of indulgent treatments

including Thai massage, aromatherapy, ayurvedic

therapies, rich facials and lavish body treatments

all using the finest ingredients — as well as

treatments based on the healing and beautifying

properties of gemstones and precious metals.

The late ruler also has a palace on the island

which is visited throughout the year by his family.

The resort's restaurants provide an opportunity to enjoy tastes of Arabia and international cuisine.

Romantics can enjoy a candle-lit dinner under the stars listening to the gentle waves wash on the shore.

The Palm restaurant offers a breakfast buffet

with loads of choices and international Middle

Eastern dishes and there is also an all-day la carte menu.

Samak restaurant offers beachfront dining overlooking the Persian Gulf, while at Al Shams you can enjoy great food and cocktails.

For those who want to indulge in social shisha smoking, it offers one of the largest selections of tobacco blends in the Middle East.

There's a cosy library with interesting books and journals providing an insight into life in Arabia.

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Step into the spa and you immediately feel at

rejuvenate the body, mind and soul.

Sir Bani Yas Island can be combined with a

great holiday in Abu Dhabi, where there is so

much to see and experience.


You leave this wilderness sanctuary with a
